ORDINANCES FOR ADOPTION

- 7. An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of National City adopted pursuant to Government Code Section 65858 as an urgency measure to take effect immediately, enacting a moratorium prohibiting the issuance of massage technician permits or licenses and prohibiting new massage establishments from locating within the City of National City for a period of 45 days. (City Attorney)
- Raise awareness on highway billboards and signage in or on public transit buses (SIEG) and (SIBR)









Hold an awareness symposium (SIRCGR/SIP/SICP/SICH/SIS/SIGS/SIMS)





- Work with your local police department or city tourism board to identify a project idea
- Provide trafficking lure awareness information and provide homeless student support to your school district's federal McKinney-Vento Act liaison (homeless student assistance) (SIRCGR) <u>CA School District Liaisons/NV School District Liaisons</u>
- If your community has a large concentration of hotels, work with local police to

establish or participate in a <u>Hotel Watch</u> crime education program (SIRCGR)

 Provide rescue <u>backpacks</u> or Care Kits to local law enforcement or to non-profits that support victims, or hospitals <u>(SID)</u>, (SIBR), and (SIRCGR)









• Educate your community on the goods produced by child/forced labor and encourage them to take this into consideration in their buying decisions.

 Chapstick: These are at our local hospital with their logo. The National Human Trafficking Hotline is embedded in the bar-code. Every patient that is admitted

receives one. If a Nurse suspects their patient is a victim of Human Trafficking, they are to contact one of the Forensic Nurses or Social Workers. They explain to the patient the barcode is actually the Hotline number. Same for patients in the ER. (SIBR)



 Place trafficking awareness cards with Trafficking Hotline information in highly visible locations including police stations, women's centers, hospitals, urgent care centers, pharmacies, legal aid societies, hotels, etc. Also, ask restaurants, hotels, and clubs if you can put trafficking awareness cards, or post a flyer with the National Trafficking Hotline info, in their restrooms.

Backpacks: SIBR donates 2 backpacks of the 4 sizes (XS, S, M, L, XL) Containing: sports bra, panties, yoga pants, T-shirt, travel size deodorant, reusable water bottle, chewing gum, granola/protein bar, & encouraging note. These are donated to Forensic RNs at our local hospital. From the interview to the end of the exam takes 6-8 hours.

distributed by the Dress A Girl organization

 Walk-A-Thon: Funds raised from this Challenge can go to club Service Fund to support one or more trafficking victims through the Live Your Dream Education &


Training Awards, fund survivor back packs/care kits, club trafficking awareness programs, or can be donated to a non-profit that assists survivors.
